Administrative Law, Part 1 (9 credits) (1st semester)

Lecturer: Prof. Bruno Tonoletti

The course introduces students to the administrative law, considering the general principles of administrative activity and organization, recalling also the questions dealing with the law in action.

The course concerns the special laws relating to banks and financial institutions as laid down in «Testo Unico delle leggi in materia bancaria e creditizia», legislative decree 1st september 1993, n. 385 (and following amendments) and in «Testo Unico in materia di intermediazione finanziaria», legislative decree, 24 th February 1998, n. 58 (and following amendments).

Particular attention will be given to the statutory and contractual framework of banks and financial institutions, the laws and regulations concerning their business and the supervisory functions of the national authorities, in order to assess its private and public relevance and the effects of the special provisions on the taking up and pursuit of the business of credit and financial institutions.

Lectures on Bankruptcy Law, as amended by recent Law No. 80/2005 and Legislative Decree No. 6/2006, will be focused on the following topics: decision to start the liquidation procedure; effects of the decision on the debtor, the creditors, pending contracts; avoidance of prejudicial transactions; liquidation and distribution to the creditors; end of the procedure, discharge and agreements with the creditors.

Biology and the Law (3 credits) (1st semester)

Lecturer: Prof. Giampaolo Azzoni/Prof.ssa Giovanna Ruberto

The course aims to face the main juridical problems related to life sciences by examining the fundamental concepts of the general theory of law (subject, corporeity, autonomy, responsibility and so on) after the most recent developments of biology, of medicine and pharmaceutical chemistry.

The course will develop into two parts, general and monographic. In the general part, the focus will be on the relation between living being and legality, especially as regards the problems related to the human corporeity. So the stress will be put on the natural person in a philosophical and juridical perspective, on ontology of the human body and its parts, on the problem of the limits to the disposition of the body. The monographic part will start by using the concepts known in the previous part to analyse the biological and juridical problems of new technology, aiming to show how practical solutions will be conditioned also by general theoretical options.

The programme includes a general introduction to the subject, and then a close examination of Criminal Corporate Law and Financial Market Law. The study of the handbook must be added with the knowledge of the reforms (introduced by the law number 265, 28 December 2005 and the law number 62, 18 April 2005 respectively) of the corporate crimes (articles 2621 and followings of the Civil Code) and of the criminal and administrative cases in point ruled by the articles 180-187 of the "Testo Unico del Mercato finanziario" (d.lgs. 24 February 1998, number 58). Among the issues examined, special emphasis will be placed on jurisdiction over the parties, organization of the judiciary and the bar, structure of adjudication, provisional remedies, and attacks on judgments.

Criminology (6 credits) (2nd semester)

The aim of the course is to analyse the main aspects of criminological issues. The first part deals with criminology as a criminal science, and, in particular, its relations with criminal politics and criminal law. Then the focus will be on the most significant trends of criminological thought, with particular attention to the explanations of criminal behaviour. The stress will be, above all, on the causes of criminal behaviour, on the problem of its control and finally on the present crisis of the Italian Criminal System. During the course, the last projects of law regarding problems of criminological interest will be analysed.

General Theory of Law (A-L) (9 credits) (2nd semester)

Lecturer: Prof. Giampaolo Azzoni

course language: Italian

oral examination

The course A-L is addressed to the students of the first year, apart from the initial letter of the surname (as the course M-Z is addressed to the students of the following years).

The course explores the main concepts through which the law is thought and experimented (for instance, subject and legal person; juridical relationship; validity of acts and validity of rules; rules of behaviour and rules of competence; coherence and completeness of the juridical system; fundamental rights; general principles of law and so on). The course implies, above all, the reading and the comment of some key essays written by jurists, by theoreticians of law and by other experts who have studied legality as the central and peculiar aspect of the human behaviour. The course is integrated with a seminar dedicated to the Archaeology of Law.

Information Technology and the Law (6 credits) (1st semester)

Lecturer: Prof. Romano Oneda

The course – who will be kept at the Ghislieri College - aims to offer the students the chance of a secure approach to those arguments of the Italian laws that can be preliminarily faced only with a not superficial knowledge of computer science and some cryptographic acquaintances. These are arguments of essential relief in the legal world, whose significance extends constantly in parallel with the spread of the computer science technology, as the electronic documentation, the 'dematerialization', the electronic signature, the certified mail, the electronic identity card, and so on. The possession of these acquaintances constitutes one important and characterizing share of the curriculum of the student in jurisprudence, also in perspective of the future professional activities.

The student begins to deal with these themes through a preliminary training, that regards those arguments of basic Computer science that more specifically constitute indispensable instrumentation for the successive laboratorial activity.

The normative witnesses object of examination in the course are mainly the Unified Body of Laws on administrative documentation (TUDA, D.P.R. 28/12/2000 n. 445), the technical Rules on informatical documents (D.P.C.M. 13/1/2004) and the Code of the digital administration (CAD, D.Lgs. 7/3/2005, n.82).

The theoretical instruction is constantly supported by practices of laboratorial type, in which the student is led step by step towards the use of instrumentation specific software for the analysis of the computer science structures on the digital certificates, and so on.

It is also available a service of technical advising, a specific mailing list and specifically didactic-oriented software, as support to the practices of the students; we also refer to the website <http://informaticagiuridica.unipv.it>, on which the detailed programme of the course will soon be published.

International Commercial Law (6 credits) (1st semester)

The aim of the course is to analyse, in a comparative perspective, theoretical and practical aspects of International Commercial Law. First, the stress will be on the most frequent contracts in International Practise. Then the attention will be on the most important techniques of negotiations and on the writing of these contracts. During the course we will focus on the different ways of international disputes and, particularly, the features and the working of international arbitration. The course – that, for the most interested students, will be concluded with the simulation of an arbitration – is more accessible for those who know the basis of Commercial and International Law, and the Institutes of Civil Procedure and are rather familiar with the English language. The course will be integrated by specific lectures and seminars, especially regarding the Chinese Law.

(Permanent Vegetative State), legal definition of death, transplants and xeno-transplants, intellectual property rights are the main issues.

Legal rules in these fields are presented and discussed in the course. Special attention is reserved to interaction science-law and case-law at international level.

The impact of these hot topics on basic legal assumptions (such as “individual” and “physical-legal person”) and on constitutional law (in the EU and worldwide) are also discussed.

Target of the lessons is to let the students know the principal aspects of the Italian private law, with regard to its historical, economical and practical elements.

As far as the subject is concerned, the course focuses on the following matters: historical point of view of Italian private law and its characters; examination of the relevant constitutional principles; equal protection; codification; sources of law, with regard to Italian Civil code and to Italian Constitution of 1948; constitutional principles on private matters, with regard to the equal protection principle, law's legal validity, execution and construction of rules; the judge's role; conflicts of law; the legal relationship: natural persons, corporate entities; juridical facts; lapse and loss of right; judicial protection of rights; rules of evidence; rights to privacy; property; real rights; co-ownership; possession; law of contracts; obligations; default and delay; civil liability of debtor.

Furthermore, it's strongly recommended – in order to understand all the aspects of the course – a deep knowledge of the Italian Constitution and Italian main laws on private matters (that can be easily found in every civil code's edition).

These arguments are of essential relief in the legal world, and whose significance extends constantly in parallel with the spread of computer science technology, as the electronic documentation, the ‘dematerialization’, the electronic signature, the certified mail, the electronic identity card, and so on. The knowledge of these acquaintances constitutes an important and characterizing part of the curriculum of the students in the Faculty of Law, also in perspective of their future professional activities.

The normative witnesses object of examination in the course are mainly the Unified Body of Laws on administrative documentation (TUDA, D.P.R. 28/12/2000 n. 445), the technical Rules on informatical documents (D.P.C.M. 13/1/2004) and the Code of the digital administration (CAD, D.Lgs. 7/3/2005, n.82).

The theoretical instruction is constantly supported by practice in lab, in which the student is led step by step towards the use of the specific software for the analysis of the computer science structures on the digital certificates, and so on.

It is also available a service of technical advising, a specific mailing list and specifically didactic-oriented software, as support to the practice for the students; we also refer to the website <http://informaticagiuridica.unipv.it>, on which the detailed programme of the course will soon be published.
